In 2005, he retired as a Gunnery Sergeant and joined the Costa Mesa Police Department, where he has served on patrol and furthered his training.

Officer Healey currently serves as the Sniper Team Leader for CMPD SWAT, responsible for the section's monthly training. He firmly believes everyday is a training day, and still strives to further his own tactical knowledge and share it with others. His involvement in the Training Bureau includes serving as a Firearms Instructor, development and execution of the new 16 hour POST-mandated firearms course, and development and administration of the Pre-Academy, as the Lead Instructor, preparing recruits from multiple agencies for the Sheriff's Academy.

Lance hopes to reestablish Costa Mesa's K9 program and develop a new standard of excellence to ensure the program's long-term success.
